RILM *Repertoire International de Litterature Musicale* – www.library.vanderbilt.edu/articles.htm
RILM is an ongoing database of musicological bibliography. This international bibliography of scholarly writings on music and related disciplines, in 202 languages, is classified by topic, and includes original language titles; title translations in English; full bibliographic information; abstracts in English; author, journal, and subject indexes; and thesaurus.

GroveMusic – www.grovemusic.com

GroveMusic includes the full text of *The New Grove Dictionary of Music and Musicians*, second edition and *The New Grove Dictionary of Opera*. It contains over 29,000 articles with extensive cross-referencing, a browse function for articles, abbreviations, contributors and an index. In addition to articles on classical music and musicians there is increased coverage of world, jazz, popular and 20th-century music. Regular updates enhance its usefulness.

HLAS ***Handbook of Latin American Studies*** - <http://lcweb2.loc.gov/hlas/hlashome.html>

The Handbook is a bibliography on Latin America consisting of works selected and annotated by scholars. Edited by the Hispanic Division of the Library of Congress, the multidisciplinary *Handbook* alternates annually between the social sciences and the humanities. Each year, more than 130 academics from around the world choose over 5,000 works for inclusion in the *Handbook*.

Welcome to HAPI Online, the searchable Web version of the Hispanic American Periodicals Index. HAPI is your source for authoritative, worldwide information about Central and South America, Mexico, the Caribbean basin, the United States-Mexico border region, and Hispanics in the United States. From analyses of current political, economic, and social issues to unique coverage of Latin American arts and letters, HAPI Online contains complete bibliographic citations to articles, book reviews, documents, original literary works, and other materials appearing in more than 400 key social science and humanities journals published throughout the world.
